#### TEACHING NOTES

This resource is perfect to use with any book or video you have in your classroom about different extreme weather.

It includes basic word wall cards for each of the storm types. You can also use these to match the word with the picture as a matching game or pre/during reading activity.

I have included a basic web and also a KWL chart as options for students to record learning either on the writing pages or one page report templates.

The KWL can be used on its own, or the top sheet can be used in an interactive notebook. Cut along the dotted lines (not to the edge) so you can flip up to reveal each part of the KWL. You can also print and staple along the lefthand side, cut to the edge of just the top sheet to flip each part up revealing the recording page (2 versions) below.

I have also included a mini book so students can learn about a number of different types of weather and write a little about each on each page. You could also use the second cover and have them write all about one type of weather using the mini book template. You can also choose to use whichever page template you like. If students are writing more, you can use the full line sizes and color or draw on the back side of the previous page. Just choose which template you like, decide how many pages you'd like students to have, print the writing pages, staple on the left side and cut in half to make 2 booklets.

There is also an interactive notebook template for students to glue the rectangles into their notebook, flip up, and answer the prompt underneath the flap.

I have also included a photo of each of the types of weather as well to share a real life photo with your students.

\*\*Note- There are individual writing pages for each type of storm or extreme weather included. There are vocabulary cards also offered for generic weather terms (sunny, windy, cloudy, partly cloudy), however there are not photographs included and individual writing pages for each of these choices.
